Physical Education Curriculum Statement

All subjects in our curriculum are designed to drive the following key areas:

- Knowledge of the world
- Increase subject vocabulary
- Develop curiosity and enhance critical thinking skills
- Build aspirations for the future

The following core concepts underpin the teaching of physical education:

- Physical development
- Emotional development
- Social development
- Cognitive growth

We follow a broad and balanced physical education curriculum which underpins the key learning intentions of the curriculum. Our long-term vision is to provide high-quality teaching so that every child can find enjoyment and a life-long appreciation of health and fitness. We seek to inspire our children through exposure to a vast variety of physical activities, developing personal drive and supporting future sporting achievements. Our physical education curriculum is designed for pupil engagement and satisfaction whilst stimulating skills transferrable to the rest of our curriculum; physical, emotional, social and cognitive growth. We aim to supplement our curriculum teaching through specialist extra-curricular provision and participation in both inter and intra-school events.

We use a variety of resources to support teacher knowledge and improve lessons:

- The use of 'The PE Hub' curriculum for consistent and effective teaching
- Specialist coaching and instruction from a new experienced PE and Sport Instructor
- Targeted assessment tracking systems
- Unity Trust – Atlas shared drive
- Skills progression through effective differentiation (Space, Time, Task, Equipment, People, Pedagogy – STTEPP)

- Participated in extra-curricular events, either through the School Games Organiser or other school partners. These included: football league, swimming and sports leaders (Year 6 cohort).
- Staff have continued with the implementation of the curriculum provided by 'The PE Hub' which has ensured consistency of teaching across year groups and the development of key skills in a variety of physical activity.
- A 'deep dive' in to Physical Education took place during our latest Ofsted inspection with the school achieving the rating of 'Good'.
- Celebrations of sporting success remain celebrated and has now expanded to a wider scale, including parents and family members, through our 'Class Dojo' interface.
- Maintained our achievement of 'Silver Award' from the school's partnership with One Life Suffolk as part of our continuing commitment to encourage active lifestyles.
- Continued to replenish existing sports equipment across all areas of PE and sport.
- Maintained an excellent relationship with Ipswich Town Foundation to support our curriculum teaching, playground supervision and extra-curricular expertise.
- Continued provision of spare PE kit for pupil premium and non-participants to maximise the percentage of children taking part in curriculum PE.
- Contribution to the purchase of 'PlayPod' equipment with a view to integrate more active playtimes.
- Burton End Football Team (Burton Bees) participated in a local league with 9 matches. They successfully won the league with 8 wins, 1 draw, 0 losses.

Implement new ways of extending the existing culture of being physically fit and healthy through sports and play leaders and reimagining how to support this through winter.	<p>The 2023/24 National Child Measurement statistics for Burton End Primary Academy revealed the following:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - 36% of children in Reception are either obese or overweight, compared to national statistics of 22% and 20 % in Suffolk. - 37% of children in Year 6 are either obese or overweight, compared to national statistics of 34% and 31% in Suffolk.
Continue link with existing outdoor provision providers to consider improvements to the school's outdoor space, thinking about how we can encourage active playtimes.	
Work toward reimplementing the PE curriculum, formed by the subject leader, whereby the school can move towards a more sustainable model moving forwards.	Burton End's existing subscription with 'The PE Hub' is due to finish at the end of this academic year with a renewal quote of £455 per year.
	The school's recent CPD programme in Cricket has increased the capability of the subject and we have a bank of expertise and resources in the subject area. We have moved toward using the Ipswich Town Foundation to continue providing CPD for subject areas such as Dance and Gymnastics in response to a recent survey of teaching staff.
